Cancer Focus Northern Ireland has launched a new Support Your Girls campaign to raise money to set up support groups for younger women across NI who have breast cancer.

The fundraising and awareness campaign is part of Cancer Focus NI's 50th anniversary activities.

European experts in Belfast

The number of new cancer patients in NI could rocket by over 60% between 2015 and 2035 - an increase of nearly two-thirds - if we don't take rigorous action now.

Speaking after a meeting of European experts in Belfast, Gerry McElwee, our head of cancer prevention, said that this extremely worrying trend needed to be tackled urgently through effective government policy and strong partnerships with health organisations.

The European Code Against Cancer (ECAC) workshop was hosted by Cancer Focus NI and the Irish Cancer Society, with speakers highlighting ways which could cut the incidence of cancer in Europe by up to 50%.

Delegates heard of the steps being taken in NI to implement cancer prevention measures through strong local partnerships. They visited Stormont, heard about the work of the Assembly's All-Party Group on Cancer and held discussions with MLAs.

Cancer prevention reaches 70,000 NI pupils

Our cancer prevention schools programmes, from pre-school to post primary, reach around 70,000 pupils in Northern Ireland each year.

Topics range from nutrition, physical activity and care in the sun to stopping smoking and body awareness, all in a curriculum appropriate and fun skills-based programme.

It was a fantastic opportunity to spread the message about taking care in the sun and being UV aware. Our stall was a partnership with the Public Health Agency and the multi-agency group that implements the DoH skin cancer prevention strategy.

Being outdoors even on cool or cloudy days means greater exposure to UV radiation, so **#BeUVAware** and reduce your risk of skin cancer. To check the UV index visit **metoffice.gove.uk/uv** - and if it's 3 or more, protect your skin!

Ten local businesses raise £65k

The 2019 Big Shops' Showdown, organised by Business in the Community (BITCNI) on behalf of Cancer Focus NI, raised a fantastic total of £65k for the charity.



Volunteers from ten local businesses took over ten Cancer Focus NI charity shops for a day, competing to see who could raise the most money. Northstone was the overall winner raising a massive £18,612. The other businesses that took part were Arthur Cox, Baker McKenzie, Concentrix, Du Pont, Enterprise, JP Corry, PSNI, Terex and Translink.

The money will help fund pioneering cancer research at Queen's University. Cancer Focus NI and BITCNI's partnership won a highly commended award from the Institute of Fundraising NI.
